#### Big Apple back in the frame

Australian designers are gearing up for their annual invasion of the Big Apple. Zimmermann, Dion Lee, Sass & Bide, Tome and Rebecca Vallance will show as part of New York Fashion Week, starting on February 6. Local brands went sour on New York several years ago, when America's sluggish economy was a factor in labels including Josh Goot, Toni Maticevski and Willow ceasing to show there. But the retail outlook has improved and combined with the obvious global exposure NYFW generates, a considerable collection of Australian design talent is ready to try again.

The Zimmermann sisters are New York veterans, but designer Nicky Zimmermann admits she is a little more anxious than usual about her brand's upcoming autumn/winter show.

"I'm really, really looking forward to showing the collection in New York ... but to be honest, I'm probably a bit more stressed about it than usual," Zimmermann says. The stress stems from some legitimate business distractions Nicky and her sister Simone Zimmermann have had. In November, Zimmermann opened a new flagship store in Mercer Street in Soho, and the brand has confirmed a site for a new store in East Hampton. "It's been a really busy start to the year, but I'm happy with the direction of the season. The collection is quite textural and detailed," Nicky says.

#### British etailer to the rescue

As anyone who watched the recent Golden Globes fashion coverage would know, dressing for the red carpet comes with its own set of challenges. If you have a black tie event coming up and want to make an impact without exposing yourself to the wrath of the fashion police, help is at hand courtesy of Stylebop. "The goal was to help increase the presence of British design and talent on the red carpet," says Stylebop fashion director Leila Yavari. The designers have taken inspiration from diverse sources, with Emilia Wickstead channelling the southern belle, Osman referencing Grace Kelly and David Koma delving into the Japanese art of Kyudo. Priced from \$595 to \$8800, each design is available by pre-order online, with some of the prices reflecting the












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
